SUMMARY

As one of the five permanent members of the United Nations Security Council, the United States of America can often find itself at the center of human rights spaces and discussion. This module seeks to dismantle U.S.-centric models of understanding human rights in favor of a model that uplifts international solidarity. Participants will analyze comparative case studies of human rights issues in the U.S. and globally and will examine what international solidarity looks and feels like.

OBJECTIVES

- Discuss and dissect the idea of solidarity in the context of human rights work and as practitioners from the United States engaged in human rights work
- Examine U.S.-centric behaviors and international solidarity behaviors in human rights spaces and discuss strategies to identify these behaviors in one's own work
- Explore the history between the United States and the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC)
- Reflect on global perspectives and challenges using case studies
